- What are some things you can do to help the church in its ministry?
- What can you do to help take care of God's world?

What does the Earth Care Committee do? The Earth Care Committee at Sixth is an Earth Care Congregation recognized by the Presbyterian Church U.S.A. The committee works to stay up to date on environmental issues and news affecting our congregation, the community, and beyond. The committee also looks at ways to improve green practices at Sixth, hosts environmental guest speakers, allocates mission funds to environmental organizations, and runs a popular collection and recycling of hard-to-recycle items at the church.

What do you get out of participating? Being involved with the Earth Care Committee helps Sixth's congregation to affirm our urgent commitment of being good stewards of the earth. Environmental advocacy and action affects everyone, so doing our part as a congregation is an important undertaking.

We hold meetings to discuss Earth Day plans for Sixth and allocations of mission funding, as well as other meetings, typically after worship, as needed. APPROVAL OF MINUTES (from Session meeting 9/25/19) with two modifications...Sister Janice sending thanks for the shoelaces and belts for the border project is from the organization Casa San Jose, and the House Committee's first bullet point should show \$4580 for the Pgh Historical Landmark Grant rather than \$5000.

CLERK'S REPORT

- Worship Attendance 9/29: 125; 10/6:130; 10/13:93; 10/20: 156
- Motion to approve the Congregational Meeting for Sunday, November 24 at 12 pm to elect 2020 officers carried without objection.
- Roll Review of Sixth Church members not in recent attendance Carol and Vince volunteered to do some outreach and report back to session for the November meeting.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

FINANCE: (Radcliffe)

- September financials are not available for this meeting.
- Incorporation papers came in, investment money has been electronically moved to the fossil-fuelfree portfolio.
- Discussion around how to handle checks when more than one committee wants to give funds to the same organization...Tom Twiss and Pastor Kolb will work on resolving.

HOUSE: (Kaplan)

- Capital Projects
 - Ramp Repair
 - \Rightarrow **Motion** to approve a contract with Mariani and Richards for the repair of the accessibility ramp in the amount of \$4,050.00 passed w/o objection.
 - 2nd floor bathroom project (Winner), nearly complete, toilet to be repaired
 - Window #1 replaced, painter under contract for \$885.00 with Michael & Michael Painting
- Other projects
 - MTG Roof is looking at leak in sanctuary
 - Kitchen Disposer repair company is being pursued
 - 4th camera for back door is being pursued...Glenne Harlow of General Alarm Systems gave \$592 estimate plus some labor costs.
 - Emergency Disaster Response Plan highlights were reviewed
 - ⇒ **Motion** to approve the Emergency and Disaster Response Plan to be implemented so training can begin, carried without objections.

PERSONNEL: Employee Health Care

- ⇒ **Motion** to approve additional Employee Benefits for calendar year 2020 carries without objections as follows:
 - To establish two classifications for employees at Sixth with 5 or more years of service:
 - Class 1: Those who work 20 or more hours per week
 - Class 2: Those who work at least 10 but less than 20 hours per week
 - For class 1 employees, church to pay the cost of the BOP (Board of Pension) individual base health care premium (not dental or vision) beginning Jan 1, 2020 from 2020 budget adopted by Session.
 - For class 2 employees, church to pay the BOP vision and dental plan premium and contribute 5% of annual salary to the BOP 403b Employee Savings Plan.

- \Rightarrow Motion to approve Pastor's study leave, 12/9-12/13/19 to go to Abbey of the Genesee carries without objections.
- \Rightarrow **Motion** to approve Pastor's vacation, 12/26/19-1/2/20 carries without objections.

STEWARDSHIP: (Ward)

- Annual Campaign...mailings were sent out, to be wrapped up by 12/12/19
- Capital Campaign...stained glass tree ornaments to be made by kids in early December, planned giving seminar will be scheduled for next fall. The children decided to give half of their bake sale proceeds to the capital campaign.
