## From the Pastor

Advent is the season of the Christian year to pause and look, with complete honesty, at the darkness that envelops the world. It is a season that holds space for grief; that reminds us that not only are we wounded by the evil in the world, we are also perpetrators of that brokenness, through our unkindness, impatience, and selfishness.

But this year, I don't need anymore reminding about shadows and sinfulness and the complete collapse of human systems in a global pandemic crisis. Since March when we first began to quarantine, it feels like we have been trapped in a never-ending Advent, wracked with loneliness, pain, depression, and needless suffering. In our home, we "need a little Christmas, right this very minute." We will be decorating the tree earlier. Escapism looks a little less unhealthy to us this year.

I don't know how you observe Advent, but I do know that whatever you do, there will be something about it that is missing. We accept the desolation for what it is. The losses are deep, not the least of which is being unable to congregate safely in our sanctuary for this most sacred celebration.

At the beginning of Advent, our holy Scriptures speak often of the end of trouble. That the sufferings of the present are not worth comparing to the glory that will be revealed. Give yourself permission to savor joy when it comes. Feel the sadness, then let it go. The pandemic is not going to last forever. We are learning things about ourselves, and growing as people, even in this season that seems so futile. If there is anything to remember in this particularly poignant Advent of 2020, it is that nothing, absolutely nothing, separates us from God's love.

## About Advent



I've been sorting through Advent calendars and devotionals to send out for families to use at home. As I look through all the possibilities, I am getting overwhelmed and think that perhaps the best thing we can do for ourselves this year is to keep things simple. We are zoomed out. We are frustrated with having to print this document, download that, and log in there. As we approach Advent this year, I am personally drawn into the idea of slowing things down and participating in the waiting. I am going to revisit the book called "Learning to Walk in the Dark" by Barbara Brown Taylor and embrace the darkness.

There are also two phrases I have been thinking about recently that I will try to use as a guide during this Advent season, and maybe they will be meaningful for your family as well.

"Take your time." "What works?"

Both sentences come from my friend and former first-grade teacher, Mr. Nyswaner. "Take your time!" was his mantra to the class as we were practicing reading and writing. I hear him say that often in my head when realizing I have been making silly mistakes and forgetting things because I am in a hurry to get something done. (Side note: I also remember that he would promise us that if we were good listeners and were taking our time with our work, he would reward us by doing a headstand on Fridays.)

Over the years I have called Mr. Nyswaner for guidance on working with kids and parents. In one extremely helpful conversation about managing disruptive behavior, he told me to stop asking parents what they "do" at home and start asking parents what "works" at home. Always focus on what works, he said.

This year I am sending out a choose your own adventure-themed Advent calendar. The idea is to light a candle together with your family on the Sundays in Advent and then choose from a list of suggested ideas throughout the week or create your own. Or not! The idea is to take your time this advent season and focus and embrace what is working. What is bringing your family joy and comfort? When you identify those things focus on them – and do more of that!

For those of you that may want to lean into Advent a little more, I am also sending a weekly Advent devotional and coloring sheets (for kids and grownups!) created by Illustrated Ministry. Due to copyright restrictions, they are now available for us to post and download. Please let me know if you would like additional copies of the coloring sheets or the devotional to share and I will mail them out.

Peace and Blessings to you all as we end this crazy year. I can't wait until we can all be safely worshipping together again!

## Here are a few suggestions for devotionals and daily readings for Advent! Ask your favorite local bookseller to order one for you.

*A Weary World: Reflections for a Blue Christmas* by Kathy Escobar: Escobar provides twenty-eight daily reflections paired with prayers and practices to honor our struggles during the holidays.

*Advent for Everyone: A Journey with the Apostles* by N.T. Wright: Biblical scholar and author N. T. Wright provides his own Scripture translation and brief reflection, helping readers understand Advent in the wider context of God's love. Each week discusses key themes for the season: thanksgiving, patience, humility, and joy.

*Always a Guest* by Barbara Brown Taylor: While this is not an Advent devotional, this collection of stories and sermons of faith, grace, and hope will do well for weekly or daily reading.

*The Advent Story Book* by Laura Richie: *The Advent Storybook* offers a simple question at the end of each story that helps readers engage in understanding the bigger story God wants us all to know – the good news of Jesus.

*Unwrapping the Names of Jesus* by Asheritah Ciuciu: This devotional leads readers through the four weeks of Advent (Hope, Preparation, Joy, and Love). Each week includes an interactive family devotional that equips readers to celebrate Advent together, offers five daily reflections that focus on that week's name of Jesus, and includes suggestions for fun-filled family activities or service projects.

*God With Us* by Katie Pawlack: *God With Us* makes the celebration of Advent simple, memorable, and Gospel-focused. Daily readings correspond with twenty-five symbols from the Old and New Testaments. Short prayers and extension activities provide a flexible and engaging approach to celebrating Advent. Following in the tradition of The Jesse Tree, in the days leading up to Christmas, a tree, banner, or branch is decorated with ornaments depicting symbols from stories in the Bible that point ahead to the lineage and birth of Christ, the long-awaited Messiah. Images of hand-embroidered felt ornaments accompany each day's reading. The appendices at the back of the book list the verses referenced for each reading in full, as well as images of each day's ornament or symbol that can be photocopied and made into ornaments.

# Sixth Church and God's Creation



Being an Earth care congregation can take many forms. It can affect what we do at the church and what we do at home. I think it is great that we have ways to recycle many products (at least when we can go to church). However, the whole acronym is to reduce, reuse and recycle. I decided to look into ways to reduce the amount of plastics used in the home. In August, Nora Johnson and I bought a variety of products that did not use plastics to see how we liked them.

Overall, many of these products are a bit more expensive than their counterparts that can be bought locally, but the tradeoff of not creating plastic waste may be worth it.

This is by no means all of the products out there. I have continued to search and am in the process of buying more items to try.

Here are our results:

## **Bathroom:**

**Toilet tissue**\_ 100% recycled toilet paper from Who Gives a Crap ([wedo@whogivesacrap.org](mailto:wedo@whogivesacrap.org))

This toilet paper rolls come individually wrapped in paper in a cardboard box. 50% of the profits goes to buying toilets in various underprivileged countries. They also have **tissues and paper towels** that I have just ordered. Both Nora and I liked the toilet tissue.

**Handkerchiefs** ([hello@lastobject.com](mailto:hello@lastobject.com)) Several people I know are using handkerchiefs instead of tissues. I found a nifty container called LastTissue that is great for carrying the handkerchiefs in your bag. It is a silicone container that holds 6 handkerchiefs. There is a slit at the bottom where you pull out a clean handkerchief. You open the top to put in the used handkerchief. There is a silicone barrier sewn on one of the handkerchiefs that separate the dirty ones from the clean ones. This way you always have a clean handkerchief and the dirty ones are contained in one place until you are ready to wash them.

**Toothpaste tablets** ([bitetoothpastebits.com](http://bitetoothpastebits.com)) These are tablets that you gently chew and it turns into a foam that you brush your teeth with. The tablets come in a refillable glass jar. They also make **tablets for mouthwash** which we did not try.

Nora liked these tablets a lot and would definitely buy them again. I was ok with them but am not sure I would want to use them all of the time. Kirk did not like them at all. Regular toothpaste seems to surround the teeth better than the tablets. They would be great to use on vacation or camping trips.

**Minted Waxed Silk Dental Floss** ([info@shopetee.com](mailto:info@shopetee.com)) This came with a glass container and two spools of dental floss. Both Kirk and I liked this floss and would buy it again. You can buy just the floss but it is a little hard to find it on their website.

**Shampoo and Conditioner Soap Bars** (hello@theearthlingco.com) I really liked the idea of using bars that needed no plastic bottles. However although I liked how my hair looked and felt, I developed an itchy scalp when I used them. I wrote to the company to ask if they knew what I might be allergic to but received no answer. I have just ordered another type of bar shampoo from Etee to see if they work better.

**Deodorant** (we@byhumankind.com) This deodorant comes with a refillable container. It works pretty well. I had been using **Native deodorant** but it came in a plastic container. They have just come out with a paper container on some of their scents so I will be trying this next.

### Laundry Room:

**Stain and Odor Laundry Detergent Pods** (info@dropps.com) This is a powder that comes individually wrapped in a plastic-looking wrapper. This wrapper is made from polyvinyl alcohol which is considered a biodegradable polymer. It can be made by synthetic sources or plant oils. It is considered marine safe if it is a vegetable oil-based polymer. However I read that the starting compound is ethylene gas which is made from oil. So even though it worked well, Nora and I are looking at other options. I just ordered from Blueland (hello@blueland.com) tablets that come in a metal refillable box but have no PVA in them. It is still much better than using plastic jugs for your detergent.

**Wool Dryer Balls** These are to be used in the dryer to soften the clothes and reduce static. They help but I really missed fabric softener. I am looking for other alternatives.

**Laundry Detergent Sheets** (hello@kindlaundry.com) I really liked these sheets. They worked well and had a shorter list of ingredients than other laundry detergents had. However, although it was not as obvious, it still had PVA in it. When I contacted the company, they said that their PVA was made from coconut oil which is better than the synthetic kind. The company was very responsive to my inquires, which I liked.

### Kitchen:

**Dishwasher Detergent Pods** (info@dropps.com) They worked fine but the same problem with the PVA. Blueland has tablets that come in a metal box that I just ordered to try.

**Liquid Dish Soap** (info@shopetee.com) We both liked the dish soap. It comes in a beeswax container that you open and put in your own container with 12 oz of water. Works well. It also came with a Loofah sponge which I absolutely loved. It does NOT get smelly. Also they have cellulose cleaning cloths that do not smell either.

Etee makes everything they sell so they can oversee the entire supply chain. It is all plastic free. Their factories are powered by renewable energy.

Hopefully this will give you some ideas on how to reduce your use of plastic in your household.

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### APPROVAL OF MINUTES

## EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

- **FINANCE:** The October financial report and a draft of Sixth Presbyterian Church's 2021 budget were presented for discussion by Finance Chair Mary Radcliffe..
- **STEWARDSHIP:** Beth Hazlett presented a stewardship campaign update detailing the following:
  - At the time of the November 2020 Session meeting, the 2020 stewardship campaign had raised \$254,590.12 of its approximately \$340,000.00 goal.
  - The stewardship campaign will continue to reach out to congregation members to encourage pledge card return and completion of 2020 financial commitments.
- **HOUSE:** House Chair Greg Winner will be communicating with Julie Mole regarding the request to use the building for a boy scout troop.
- **PERSONNEL:** A personnel report was provided to Session by Personnel Chair Phyllis Rupert regarding employee benefits selection and the status of building manager Harry Kirk following a medical leave.
- **TOWER UPDATE:** At the time of the Session meeting, there are no updates from Verizon or Unison regarding the tower usage. The church is waiting for approval from the Presbytery regarding the tower lease agreement.

## PASTOR'S REPORT AND DEACONS' REPORT

- A brief update was provided to Session regarding members of the congregation who require care and assistance.

## REOPENING TASK FORCE

- Kirk Howe provided a detailed report explaining COVID-19 spread in indoor spaces such as the church sanctuary. The report also included data gained from a model that clarified the effectiveness of various safety measures that can mitigate the spread of the COVID-19 virus. The session discussed the report as it related to in-person activities in the church building.
  - **Motion to approve** the closing of the church building for all in-person activities including the December 6th outdoor Advent event but to forgo the vote on the December 16th Advent event until the next Session meeting.
  - **Motion passed** unanimously.

## OLD BUSINESS

- Revision of the Articles of Incorporation and Bylaws
- Session reviewed the revised bylaws drafted by Elder Bill Moore and Peter Watt Morse.
  - **Motion to approve** the amended bylaws and articles of incorporation
  - **Motion passed** unanimously
- Statement Against White Supremacy
  - **Motion to approve** the appointment of Kit Ayars and Carol Emerson to work with the Justice Team on a revision to the statement against white supremacy.
  - **Motion passed** unanimously.

## NEW BUSINESS AND COMMITTEE INFORMATION

- More Light Committee
  - Elder Kit Ayars presented to the session a letter of endorsement from the that would provide support for a project by Pitt faculty member Erik Schuckers. The letter was written to the University of Pittsburgh Year of Engagement Funding Committee and would support a pilot writing program for LGBTQ elders in the Pittsburgh Community.



- **Motion to approve** the sending of a letter of endorsement for the pilot writing project proposed by Erik Schuckers.
- **Motion passed** unanimously.
- Congregational Engagement Effort
  - Peter Kaplan submitted a request for approval to continue conversations with church members. The conversations are used to discern what issues are of the most importance to Sixth congregation members
    - **Motion to approve** a request to continue conversations with church members
    - **Motion passed** unanimously
- Pulpit Supply
  - **Motion to approve** Elder Kate Davoli and Pastor Myra Kazanjian provide pulpit supply services as needed.
  - **Motion passed** unanimously
