From the Pastor

When you think about it, it is amazing how much movement there is in the Bible. Abraham and Sarah left their home in Ur of the Chaldeans to spend the rest of life following the dream God gave them. Isaac and Rebecca, and Jacob, Leah, and Rachel, were constantly moving around. Later, the Hebrew people were on the move from slavery into the Promised Land. It was when they settled in the land that their problems started, and then they were on the move to exile where their renewal began again. David was at his best when he was on the move being chased by Saul. Again, his greatest sins came when he settled down and stopped moving. Jesus was always on the move, and the most wonderful things happened to the people he met along the way. The church began at Pentecost when the Holy Spirit blew the disciples out of the upper room and into the waiting world. The book of Acts and the epistles of the New Testament depict a church that is in constant change. It is hard to find anyone in the Bible who is in a serious drama with God and is undergoing a change for the better who is not on the move.

But not all moves are geographical. Sometimes it is our relationships that are in motion and constantly changing. Our jobs in our rapacious market economy are constantly changing. Inevitably, it is just the process of aging that is changing us. If living through the pandemic taught us anything, it is that to live is to change and adapt.

Often the changes we encounter are unwanted. But every change always presents us with a choice. Will we drop what we can no longer hold onto and follow Jesus to a new place? Will we learn more about what it means to trust and follow a Savior? And will we allow the inevitable changes of life to change us into persons better equipped to make a difference? Or will we waste our losses in life by settling into cynicism and despair? Those are always our choices, every new year, and they are hard.

Like the Biblical figures before him, Jesus will not settle down in 2023. Like the first disciples, we do not have to have faith in how the changes of our lives are going to work out, where we are going, or in our abilities to cope with the losses and obstacles along the way. We do not even have to have faith in ourselves. All we are asked to have faith in 2023 is the One who calls us and loves us too much to leave us alone.


