
We look forward to hearing about the new board of directors, and the evolving vision and mission of MLP at a local and national level.

The trip is still being planned but the details so far are as follows: Students entering 7th-12th are invited to travel to Washington DC. to stay at the Friends Place, a Quaker guest house and learning center blocks from the nation's Capitol. Friends Place offers opportunities for experiential education and civic engagement programs focused on how people-power creates justice, peace, a healthy planet, and a stronger democracy. We will be visiting the Presbyterian Office of Public Witness, and serving alongside agencies working for food justice in DC. We will also be visiting museums and monuments. The cost for the week will be \$450 per student. The group will travel to DC using the ELPC church bus. Sarah Hackett and Jenny Newman will lead the trip. 
Vacation Church School

THANK YOU, THANK YOU, THANK YOU.

I am so grateful I got to see many of you on Sunday, March 10, when I came to say goodbye. I am deeply appreciative for the service that was organized by Pastor Sarah, Douglas, and Jenny, for the cards and emails, and for the unexpected generous retirement gift. Thank you.

It was such a happy and sad day. I am happy that we did get to see one another one last time, but I am sad that illness cut my ministry at Sixth short. But I am still not healthy enough to return to work, so the wisdom of decisions made this past summer have been vindicated. It is time for me to move into retirement, and time for Sixth to move into a new season of ministry with a gifted new pastor.

Our God is a God of the future. Jesus is always moving ahead of his disciples, beckoning us to follow. I trust that Sixth is uniquely poised to continue to be a beacon of life and hope and light in Pittsburgh and southwestern Pennsylvania. I am grateful that I got to be a part of this ministry for 10 precious years.

Moving forward, I make the following two promises to you. I will commit to praying for you for a year. I will "unfollow" many of you on social media. I will not accept invitations to conduct funerals or officiate at weddings. Those privileges are the responsibility of your interim pastor and will be the responsibility of your new pastor. The only way for you to begin your relationship with your new pastor is for me to completely step aside. Robert Frost once said that "good fences make good neighbors." Honoring this boundary allows your new pastor to begin with the same "fresh start" that I had 10 years ago and ensures that we both can move into the new futures that are before us. I trust that the God who has always held us will hold you and hold me as we move into that future.

Thank you once again for the celebration on March 10 and for the privilege of being your pastor. I will remember you with affection and tenderness for the rest of my days.

Temple Sinai Hosts Deadly by Design: A Presentation About Gun Violence Prevention

Temple Sinai and RAC- PA, the Pennsylvania chapter of the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism, in partnership with CeaseFirePA, will host a screening about gun violence in Pennsylvania and opportunities for prevention on Sunday, April 28 from 1-2:30 p.m. It is free and open to the public. The presentation will take place at Temple Sinai, 5500 Forbes Avenue, Pittsburgh, PA 15217.

Deadly by Design will share stories of Pennsylvanians who have experienced losses due to gun violence. Those individuals believe that the best way to save the next life is to address the gaps in Pennsylvania laws. The program will discuss Extreme Risk Protection Orders and Universal Background Checks, two bills that have been passed by the Pennsylvania House of Representatives and await consideration by the Pennsylvania Senate. The presentation will conclude with an opportunity to share personal experiences and feelings about gun violence.

Invitation from the Church and Community Committee to Submit Names of Organizations to Fund in 2024

The Church & Community Committee of Sixth is beginning our allocation process for 20024, identifying and selecting groups to fund. We invite you to recommend organizations. Either groups that provide direct assistance to those in need, or groups that advocate for important social or political change can be proposed.

If you have an organization you would like to submit, we ask that you provide a report by Sunday, May 12 describing the organization. If possible, your report should include:

- A summary of the nature and mission of the organization.
- The organization's accomplishments (emphasizing its most recent work), and why you believe it is worthy of financial support.
- A Web link or information on how to contact the organization.
- Whether you think the organization is primarily engaged in advocacy, direct assistance, or both.
- And if you can find it, the following for scoring purposes:
 - ◆ The involvement of Sixth Church members (including yourself) in the organization (e.g., volunteer work, serving on the organization's board, serving as an officer).
 - The amount of revenue the organization received in the most recent 12-month period for which information is available.
 - ◆ The racial composition of the Board of Directors.
 - Whether or not the organization is faith-based.

Notes from the March Session Meeting

(NB: notes from Session are pulled from yet-approved minutes)

Rev. Sarah Robbins and Kathi Robinson-Dassel, Clerk of Session, were present.

Rev. Robbins began the meeting at 7:05 p.m. with a time of sharing, followed by the opening prayer.

CLERK'S REPORT:

- Worship: In Person/YouTube: 3/3 (78/60), 3/10 (130/71), 3/17 (95/32)
- One (1) Sixth Church voting Commissioner allotted for Pittsburgh Presbytery Meetings, 2024
- Presbytery Meetings for 2024
- Thursday, May 23 Pittsburgh Theological Seminary at 1:00PM-Scott Bell
- Thursday, October 3 Crestfield Camp and Conference Center at 10:00 AM
- Thursday, December 12 Northmont United Presbyterian Church at 1:00 PM
- Session Minutes Review-Clerk will attend on April 6, 2024

OMNIBUS MOTION:

- Motion to approve the Agenda as presented
- Motion to approve the Omnibus

With one minor correction on the Omnibus, the Agenda and Omnibus were approved unanimously/

PASTORAL REPORT:

- Session agreed to provide fellowship following worship on Palm Sunday. Elder Barbara Parees will be point person. Jenny Newman will have prayer stations available on Palm Sunday and through Holy Week, so there will be time/place for fellowship and for reflection.
- Rev. Robbins reported that wording on a flyer included in the bulletin will be reviewed and edited.
- During the April 17 Session meeting, the confirmation class will attend to share their statements of faith and answer questions about their faith journeys. In turn, the youth are encouraged to ask Session members questions as well.
- Rather than risk travel issues when returning from her continuing education trip to Japan, Rev. Robbins will seek pulpit supply for May 5.
- Rev. Robbins reminded the elders that there is still a need for a Personnel chair and committee. Several recommendations were made.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE:

- FINANCE: Elder Peter Watt-Morse did not have any relevant information to add to the reports that were shared for the Session packet.
- •PERSONNEL: Brief update given.
- •HOUSE: Elder Tom Juring reported that a more formal calendar (for all) and guidelines for building use by outside groups will need to be better defined.
- •STEWARDSHIP: Elder Peter Kaplan shared that the meeting to begin discussing the 2025 campaign will be held in April.

•PNC:

- •Following the information provided about the CAT Survey, Elder Joe Ashenden shared that there are two areas that Session can be most helpful: 1-Mission and Vision of Sixth-it was generally agreed that the current mission statement remains a good reflection of who we are now. Once a new pastor has been hired, the mission statement will be reviewed and tweaked if necessary. 2-Recommendations for tasks and duties for the new pastor-Elder Ashenden and Andrew Swensen, as members of the PNC, have agreed to work on this. Elders Barb Parees and Scott Bell volunteered to participate as well.
- ◆The goal is to have a draft of the MDP for the next Session meeting, April 17.
- Rev. Robbins sought suggestions for the best way to share the executive summary of the CAT SCAN with members of the congregation. By consensus, Rev. Robbins will incorporate the information into worship on April 14, followed by an email blast to the congregation. Immediately following the April 14 service, she will share more information about the PNC process and answer questions.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

- Church and Community: Elder Peter Kaplan reported that the C & C would like to encourage more members to attend their meetings. They have just begun the process of collecting reports to award allocations of funds. The goal is to accelerate the process of distributing the funds. Elder Kaplan would like to encourage new non-profit suggestions/reports and will share this in the upcoming newsletter.
