Earth Care News

We hope everyone enjoyed our church's pollinator garden this year and tried some of the plants in your own garden. But how do we prep the gardens for winter. Did you know that the many perennials offer food, habitat and visual interest for the winter garden.



It won't be a tidy garden where everything is cut back in the fall. The plump seeds hidden in the faded flower heads will feed non-migratory birds that stay for the winter. The berries left on bushes and trees also feed the birds. Pushing fallen leaves on gardens to insulate plants and nourish the soil will shelter hibernating insects that in turn will sustain ground feeding birds. It will be a bit like nature's own bug hotel!

I grew up in in Spain and attended school mostly in France. Catholicism surrounded me in Spain, but I did not fully understand it. I eventually became a Catholic at age 28 in Barcelona. I came to the US in 1988 and attended Bryn Mawr and Drexel.

One night I had a wonderful spiritual experience with Jesus Christ, which moved me to join an African American Baptist church. I chose to convert to Protestantism not so much because I rejected Catholicism but as part of my spiritual growth. After experiencing the Holy Spirit as a white light that showed me everything that I had done in my life and gave me the chance to repent, I needed more Bible-focused instruction.

By the time I moved to Pittsburgh, I had chosen Presbyterianism because of its intellectual approach. I joined Sixth on Easter morning in 2016. Both at Sixth and my previous Presbyterian church in New Jersey, I struggled with doubts that God answered one by one.

At Sixth I became a deacon, which showed me



how many actions Sixth takes to help others. I enjoy Wednesday Bible Study, where I learn from different points of view, and serving as a liturgist. Sixth has become a place where I feel comfortable and liked. My bonds continue to widen and deepen.

My main enjoyment each week is to sit in the sanctuary and reflect. The habit of attending each Sunday has helped me to live in better communion with God. I have been pledging to Sixth Church since I joined. I am pleased to contribute financially to church life. I prayerfully decide how much I will give each Sunday and then work to meet my pledge by the end of the year. I encourage you to join me.

When our family moved to Pittsburgh, searching for a new church wasn't high on our agenda. We had too much to do - a new high school for our youngest, sending another off to her first year of college, and our just married son moving to Brooklyn. My husband Jim and I were starting a new research lab at Pitt med school, totally from scratch. Not a lot of time was left to discover our new neighborhood, much less search for a church.

Then, two planes ran into the World Trade Center, where our new daughter-in-law was working on the first floor. With scarce communication, it took all day before we heard that she was safe. Everything was changing. Sunday morning, we set out on Forbes to find a newspaper (they were sold out) but we noticed that this church on the corner was just opening its doors. We heard the beautiful organ, and we entered. John McCall's sermon was strong, the music was good, and as a bonus, there was a familiar voice just behind us - yep, Fred Rogers. The caring people in the pews were like a consoling family.

Fast forward 25 years. Sixth Church is like my second home in so many ways. Both these homes depend on me now for keeping them in shape and functioning as Jesus would want, whether it's donations to repair the roof, service to others in need, or acting as an advocate for peace.

I will be increasing my monthly pledge again this year.
